PREFACE

Korba, the power capital of Chhattisgarh, is situated on the banks of the confluence of the two rivers Hasdeo and Ahiran. The district is situated in the northern half of the state and is the home of several tribes including the protected tribe Korwas (Pahadi Korwas) from whom the district gets its name. Korba is blessed with a lush green forest cover abounding with rare species of flora and fauna. These tribes live in tandem with the pristine natural surroundings and retain their distinctive features. The district is the hub of coal-mining and power-generation activities. The city houses numerous thermal power stations and several public sector undertakings as well as underground and open-cast coal mines. These activities have resulted in making Korba one of the most highly polluted cities of India.

The college is affiliated to Bilaspur University, Bilaspur and is situated in a vast verdant campus of 50 acres. The college caters to the educational needs of the students of this tribal area. It is committed towards the fulfillment of its VISION and MISSION statement. Majority of the students come from the rural, socio-economically weaker section of the society and the faculty strives to impart quality education through modern innovative methods of teaching and instilling moral ethics for the complete development of their personality.

The college was awarded 'B' grade with CGPA of 2.69 by NAAC in January 2011 and now it is volunteering for the second cycle of reaccreditation. The process of preparation of the Self Study Report has been an attempt to assess the quality of the education imparted by the college. This process of self evaluation has definitely not been a cake-walk but has proved to be a journey of self realization, analysis and growth.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Government EVPG College is a co-educational post graduate institute affiliated to Bilaspur University, Bilaspur C.G. The college was established in 1981 to fulfill the **Vision** of imparting quality and joboriented education with moral ethics and discipline to the students of the tribal area. Since then the college has been committed to achieving this goal by catering to the needs of this industrial city. It has now created a special position as the lead college of the district since 2009. The college is situated on a lush green, sprawling campus of 50 acres wherein all efforts are taken to sensitize the students towards environmental protection and steps are taken to provide a green cover to overcome the heavy pollution in the city caused by the coal mining activities and the numerous power plants in the region.

The college offers 03 UG and 12 PG degree courses besides 02 Postgraduate diploma courses (PGDCA and PGDBM). The college boasts of active units of NCC, NSS and Youth Red Cross Society whose members are dedicated to the welfare of the college.The current student strength is 2322. The college is endowed with facilities such as 20 class rooms,10 laboratories, 01 computer lab, 01 English lab, 01 hall, a separate sports block and a separate library building, canteen and girls hostel whose possession is awaited. The huge playground has volleyball and basket ball courts, cricket pitch, provision for athletics and a new outdoor stadium with washrooms and restrooms. The Sports department also boasts of a mini gymnasium.

There is a great emphasis on the need for imparting quality education by following the Academic Calendar, conducting internal tests and their evaluation, enhancement of ICT aided teaching methods, organizing lectures, conducting competitions, celebrating events as per the state government directives, and motivating the students to ensure their moral and spiritual growth with social responsibilities and awareness.

1. CURRICULAR ASPECTS :

The college is affiliated to Bilaspur University and has to follow the syllabus laid down by the University. Several senior teachers are members, Dean and Chairman of the Board of Studies, Executive council and Academic Council and are instrumental in giving valuable suggestions pertaining to the syllabus and examinations. Proposals for new courses such



as BBA and BCA, under the self finance scheme and MSW under RUSA scheme have been sent. Students can choose from a wide array of optional subjects at the under graduate level and similar options in post graduation are also available. Apart from academics, students are encouraged to participate in other activities of NCC, NSS, Sports, YRC as well as various competitions also. Lectures on academics, career counselling, health, motivational and holistic awareness are organized in the college. Students are encouraged to fill the feed back forms related to the course, syllabus, teachers' performances, etc. and these are analysed by the IQAC.

2. TEACHING- LEARNING EVALUATION :

Admissions are carried out on the basis of merit according to the government rules and its reservation rules are strictly followed. Internal tests are conducted according to the Academic Calendar and the evaluation of the tests enable the teachers to identify slow and advanced learners and cater to their requirements.

In teaching, lecture method is predominant but use of modern teaching aids and internet facility help to enhance teaching skills. Debate, quiz and group discussion are some of the interactive methods used by the teachers. The English Club uses the mode of participatory leadership by inviting the post graduate students to conduct the activities of the club. The facility of Inflibnet is available for the students and the staff. Students go for excursions, academic tours, industrial visits, field trips and surveys to broaden their vision. Staff members are encouraged to attend seminars and workshops to become competent in imparting sustainability to their teaching. Lot of emphasis is laid on the thorough understanding of the graduate attributes of the college.

3. RESEARCH CONSULTANCY, EXTENSION :

Setting up of a new Research Centre in Sociology is an important achievement. The college boasts of 01 D.litt., 18 PhD,02 M.Phil and 06 Postgraduate degree holders among the teachers. Several teachers are engaged in publication of research papers in national and international journals. Two minor projects have been successfully completed by two faculty members. One member of the staff with D.litt. is a member of the editorial board of a journal. Teachers interact with local schools and colleges as judges, subject experts for teachers' interviews, guest lectures, etc. Extension activities are carried out with zeal and enthusiasm. Students participate in rallies, formations of human chains, visit to the hostel of



differently disabled and deaf, dumb and blind children to spend quality time with them. NSS volunteers go to villages in their camps to enhance awareness on health, hygiene, aids, blood donation and the need for voting in them.

4. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES :

The main building of the college was built with the joint assistance of all the leading PSUs of Korba. The college shifted to the present campus in 1985. The greenery in the campus and the activity of plantation are highly responsible in spreading the message of environmental conservation. Though the inadequacy of funds does not allow the construction of a boundary wall, despite proposals being sent to the higher authorities, the management has now conceived an innovative, eco-friendly step of creating a fence and hedging it. The girls' hostel is ready and its possession is awaited. Post accreditation initiatives include launching of the college website, providing internet facilities, construction of two bus stops, an outdoor stadium, three additional class rooms with a toilet and a ramp in the entrance for the differently disabled students. The General Library has over 50000 books, separate library for students belonging to SC,ST Category, bright and ventilated reading rooms, Inflibnet facilities, etc. Post graduate students have access to rich departmental libraries which are often handled by themselves under the guidance of the teachers.

5. STUDENTS SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION :

Scholarships are provided for all the students belonging to the SC, ST and OBC categories and BPL students according to the rules of the government. Economically weak students of unreserved category are also given financial aid by the staff as and when required. Students belonging to SC and ST Category also receive stationery and the Book bank is helpful to the BPL students. The college has an affordable fees structure with special concessions given according to the categories and for girl students also. Personality Development, moral ethics, discipline, social responsibilities and leadership skills are developed by students when they involve in the activities of NCC, NSS and YRC. The Student Union Election was organized as per the Ordinance of the Affiliating University. Important telephone numbers of the Principal, nearest police station, etc. are displayed in the college. The activities of the departmental associations are regularly conducted by the post graduate students. The college has an Anti-Ragging cell and a Grievance Redressal Committee. Under the XI plan of UGC remedial coaching for the students belonging to the SC, ST category was



organized. Students are provided great flexibility in examinations. Regular students can reappear for supplementary exams and if they fail they can reappear as private candidates and then as super supplementary candidates. Students can also be permitted to send their answer copies to the Affiliating University for rechecking or revaluation. This is instrumental in controlling the drop out rate. Efforts are made by the college to increase the GER in the region. The annual magazine of the college 'URJA' and the six monthly newsletter 'MIRROR' showcase the talents and achievements of the students.

6. GOVERNANCE AND LEADERSHIP MANAGEMENT :

The Principal plays an important role in maintaining discipline and proper governance in the college. The recommendations of the IQAC which are found in the minutes of the meetings are used for the college welfare. The AF committee, College Development committee and JanBhagidari samiti are instrumental in implementing the development plans of the college. UGC is the prime funding agency, the IDP (Institutional Development Plan) focuses on the development of the college infrastructure, creation of a new ICT room, construction of a new girls common room. Regular teachers are recruited by the State Government and temporary teachers are appointed by an Internal Committee and approved by the Jan Bhagidari Samiti. Since the Institution is the lead college of the District, various examinations such as PET ,PMT, PAT, PSC etc. are conducted here through VYAPAM. The various committees constituted by the Principal ensure the smooth functioning of the college.

7. INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES :

Innovations include participative and leadership methods wherein Postgraduate students of English Literature conduct the activities of the English Club. Post graduate students of all the other departments host the programmes organised by the Departmental Associations. In the Sports Department, the Alumni are invited as coaches for cricket, football and other games and as Referees. Recycling of used papers and files is an innovative step taken by teachers and office staff to carry out their activities. Tree plantation is one of the best practices which is followed regularly. Workers are taught to segregate garbage and advised not to burn it but to dump organic waste into the two compost pits available in the campus. The construction of a Botanical garden is an innovative measure to keep the campus clean and green. The majority of the students come from rural areas with Hindi as the medium of instruction, hence the activities of the English



club and the modern updated English lab are planned to develop communicative skills among these students.

The college was accreditated with 'B' grade in 2011 and now it is volunteering for the second cycle of reaccreditation. The preparation of SSR is the joint effort of all the staff members. The SSR reflects the realistic situation of the college. The generosity of the Principal in giving a free hand to the Committee to use man power, physical facilities and funds to prepare this report needs genuine appreciation. Continuous cooperation, support and motivation from all the staff members (Teaching and non-teaching) also deserve mention. Typing support was provided by the alumni of the department of English. Assistance in upgrading the website and uploading of AQAR and SSR was provided by students from the local Engineering College.

- Inadequate class rooms.

- Poor socio- economic background of students especially from rural areas causes increase in the drop- out rate especially among girls.
- Students' complete dependence upon the cheap market guides rather than upon text books, journals and reference books.
- Poor exposure to English and no communicative skills either.
- No provision for direct revision of syllabus.
- No provision for the internal assessment of the students.
- The transition years of the affiliating university were from 2013 to 2015 during which research activities reduced considerably. Lack of adequate equipments, laboratories and funds result in poor research



activities among qualified teachers. Excessive burden of teaching and other additional duties also leads to less research activities .

 - There is no provision for the Institution to supplement the University curriculum.

 - Lectures are supplemented by additional study material, paper presentations, interactive sessions, tours, visits, and good exposure to internet facilities.
 - Counselling on job and career prospects alongwith focus on personality development, communicative and language skills and thrust on moral ethics is also a part of the strategy to help the students to become competent for the needs of the dynamic employment market.
 - The college had organized skill development programmes.
- **1.3.3** Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc; into curriculum?
 - There is no provision for the institution to make amends in the curriculum which is prepared by the Affiliating University.
 - Lectures have been conducted on gender issues, gender sensitization, women empowerment etc;



- Environmental awareness is created by organizing tree plantation programmes, use of compost pits for organic waste disposal, creation of rain water harvesting pit, notices <u>and</u> warnings about the hazards of the use of polythene.
- Creation of a green belt in the campus and developing a botanical garden are also steps taken in this direction.
- Newly enrolled students who have Environmental studies in their curriculum are motivated to become aware of the local situation and prepare project files accordingly.
- Ban on the use of air horns in the campus.
- Teachers lay stress on inculcating moral values and creating consciousness about human rights.
- The General library is equipped with facilities of N-List_and INFLIBNET and students are encouraged to create their e-mail id and make optimum use of these facilities for their studies.
- Students belonging to rural background are encouraged to develop their computer skills.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

No such courses are offered to the students but several steps taken to ensure holistic development of the students are enumerated below.

- The institution has conducted many useful, inspiring and holistic lectures by organizations such as Gayatri Parivar, Art of Living Foundation etc, on drug abuse, meditation, Yoga and peace etc.
- The first World Yoga Day was celebrated on June 21st 2015 to highlight the role of Yoga in creating physical and mental well-being. This was attended by all the staff and many students.
- Impetus on Sports and NCC for enhanced career options such as Police Department, Defence services etc.
- Students are motivated to join NSS and participate in the various extension activities which are carried out.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

- The institution is an affiliated college and does not have the authority to design or directly improvise on the curriculum which is prepared by the Affiliating University.
- Several senior staff members are Members of the Executive Council and Board of Studies of the Affiliating University. They communicate the feedback regarding course content from the college faculty to the Affiliating University for necessary action.
- **1.4.2** Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes' how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?
 - Yes, there is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students about the curriculum. They are given printed questionnaires which comprise of the nature of the programme, course completion, teachers' performance etc.
 - The feedback contents are analyzed and the suggestions and opinions expressed therein are considered upon by the Principal and Staff.
 - The analysis of the feedback is not directly communicated to the University but the members of the teaching staff who are in the Board of Studies do make representations of the student opinions regarding the curriculum during the meetings.



1.4.3 How many new programs/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

- Government sanctioned post graduate programme in Botany was introduced in 2010-11 with 30 seats in keeping with the growing demand for P.G. programmes in all the science subjects.
- Post graduate programme was introduced in Geography in 2006 under the self-finance scheme and it has been regularized by the government in 2015.







2.1 STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- Our college is one of the oldest colleges of the district. It is a well known institution which ensures its publicity through advertisement in the local dailies and the institutional website. Nearly 32 odd batches of old students are living examples of the calibre of the college and their reference plays a vital role in ensuring the publicity of the college..
- All the information regarding admissions is made available in the college prospectus which is provided with admission forms.
- The prospectus contains details about the number and range of courses, elective options offered, eligibility, fees structure, faculty information, and forms for NCC and NSS.
- The above information is also uploaded on the college website <u>www.gevpgkrb.ac.in</u>.
- Admission notices are also sent to local news papers and are displayed on the notice board of the college as well.
- Complete transparency is maintained in the admission process which is followed by the merit and reservation rules of admissions laid down by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh and the Affiliating University.
- 2.1.2 Explain in details the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the institution.

The process of admission is carried out as per the rules of the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh and the Ordinance of the Affiliating University, primarily on the basis of merit. Committees for admissions of all classes are formed and the entire merit list is approved by the Principal before display. Preference is given to students belonging to Korba district. Regular admissions are completed till 31st of July and with the permission of the Vice-Chancellor of the Affiliating University till 14th of August.



i. Merit:

All the forms are scrutinized minutely and a merit list is formed according to the reservation rules of the state government as per amendments also. General merit list includes forms of students belonging to SC, ST, OBC and General category. Thereafter forms are separated into reservation categories as per rules. There is reservation for girls and adequate seats are reserved for the physically challenged students and the third gender.

- Government of Chhattisgarh offers job opportunities on merit basis in the teaching sector as Shiksha Karmi. In the private schools there is a growing demand for post graduates in all science subjects and languages.
- At the UG level the number of forms obtained are much higher than the available seats which indicate a positive trend.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

- 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
 - During the admission process students who are differently-abled are given reservation and priority as per the government policies.
 - Care is taken to escort these students to their class rooms and provide rooms on the ground floor with proper seating arrangement.
 - During examinations also their seats are arranged on the ground floor and facility for attendant is provided if required.
 - Visually impaired students are permitted to bring a writer during examinations with prior permission from the Affiliating University.
 - The main building provides a separate entry with ramp for students with wheelchairs or tricycles.
 - Special programmes and competitions are conducted to include them in the main stream of the student faculty.
- 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.
 - Yes, all the teachers take special care to make the students feel comfortable with their courses.
 - In the introductory lectures, students are drawn into discussions by the teachers, and their levels and needs are gauged and thereafter teachers decide their levels of teaching and adopt student-centric methods of teaching.
 - Since the college is situated in a tribal area the students have poor exposure to English language and modern innovations in teaching and learning.



- Therefore teachers simplify their topics and focus on conveying all the information to the students in Hindi language and then later move on to advanced mode of teaching.
- Students are given guidance and motivation along with quality education to enable them to become eligible to face the modern society and career prospects.
- Special help is given to slow learners in the form of extra coaching and study material by teachers in their spare time(after classes).
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?
 - None of the above mentioned courses are offered to the students but the teachers identify slow and advanced learners and try to cater to their needs.
 - Completion of syllabus within the stipulated time span is compulsory but teachers lay stress on taking care of slow learners by giving them repeat lectures on certain topics, supplying notes and study material and motivating them to appear for internal tests so that the become familiar with the syllabus.
 - Similarly, teachers also pay equal attention to the advanced learners. They are given guide lines, handouts, advanced study material related to their course.
 - Advanced learners in P.G. are encouraged to assist the teachers by handling few topics of the junior classes (U.G.). This builds their self confidence and makes their concepts very clear.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?
 - From the commencement of the academic session, students are motivated to inculcate all the aspects of the vision and mission of the institution.
 - Boys and girls are encouraged to live with mutual respect and support and it is mandatory for the boys to show complete respect and safety for the girls and the ladies staff of the college.
 - Equal and fair opportunities and dealing for all the students is stressed upon. Impartial treatment for all and care for the differently-abled ones is nurtured among the students.



- A healthy, clean, moral environment is emphasized upon in the campus.
- The healthy, friendly and good rapport among all the staff members make it compulsory for all the students to follow the same, thereby ensuring safety, discipline and upkeep of moral ethics by the students.
- Care is taken to display the contact numbers of the Principal, the college and the nearest police station in the girls' common room.
- Apart from providing a separate girls common room there is a complaint box made available wherein students can drop their complaints. This is periodically checked and the Grievance Redressal Cell takes necessary action.
- Lectures by eminent speakers on gender issues are conducted periodically.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- Performance of the students in the internal tests and their behavioural pattern in the classroom enables the teachers to identify slow as well as advanced learners.
- Advanced learners are paid extra attention and they are supplied with adequate advanced study material.
- They are encouraged by the teachers to work hard and excel in the internal examinations
- At the P.G. level such students are regularly motivated to give lectures to their juniors at the U.G. level.
- This not only builds their self confidence but also helps them to strengthen their knowledge and command over their subject.
- Advanced learners are motivated for research work also and they are provided career guidance and special coaching for competitive examinations also.



- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - Great emphasis is laid on the conducting of internal tests.
 - This enables the teachers to identify the slow learners and work upon them by providing additional study material and notes and guidance by teachers in their spare time.
 - Physically challenged students are provided help and general facilities during the programme and examinations as per University Ordinance.
 - The results of the University examinations become accurate pointers of the slow learners and help the teachers in increasing their efforts.
 - Students belonging to economically weaker sections are offered financial support when required.
 - Teachers supply specimen copies of text books and provide monetary help during paying of admission and examination fees.
 - They are also provided books through the book bank scheme.
 - Scholarships are also given by the government to students belonging SC/ST/OBC and BPL categories.
 - Extra classes, additional study material, financial aid, motivation, love and emotional support also go a long way in controlling the dropout rate.
 - Physically challenged students are offered special help according to their disability. They are also motivated to work hard and efforts are taken to keep their self-respect and dignity intact.
 - The socio-economic conditions of Korba are often quite adverse for girls who come from villages to pursue higher education.
 - Therefore keeping their background in mind girls are encouraged to learn Home science, Psychology and also English literature since these subjects can help in developing their inborn potential and also make them fit for teaching jobs.
 - Girls are encouraged to join NCC/NSS and the activities of Youth Red Cross Society of the College.



- Motivational and holistic lectures are conducted
- Guest speakers are invited to give talks on career guidance.
- Needy students are given financial support.
- Students who fail in the main examinations are given the option of appearing for supplementary examinations and the regular students are given Provisional Admission and allowed to attend classes as well.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation, blue print, etc.)
 - The Academic calendar is prepared by the State Government and provided by the Affiliating University and is followed strictly by the institution.
 - The committee for internal examinations also plans a schedule for internal tests accordingly and teachers are expected to follow it regularly.
 - The General time table of the college is prepared and the teachers prepare the departmental and individual time table.
 - Teachers maintain a Daily Diary which is monitored by the Principal. The attendance register records the daily attendance of students. Both these are submitted to the Principal at the end of the Academic Session.
 - Internal tests are conducted as per schedule and the answer sheets are evaluated and results are tabulated.
 - Notes, study material, list of reference books, handouts, additional lectures are made available to all students as per their requirement with special care to slow and advance learners.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

- At the beginning of the academic session the IQAC conducts a meeting with the Principal to propose the plan of action for the college to improve the teaching learning process.
- IQAC monitors the smooth functioning of the time table committee and the Internal Examination committee which are both instrumental in mobilizing the teaching-learning process.



- IQAC also caters to the basic needs of the students with regards to ICT and library (INFLIBNET).
- IQAC provides guidance to departmens to conduct seminars at institutional level and organize tours, visits and survey.
- The decisions taken during the IQAC meetings are implemented by the institution.
- IQAC monitors the signing of MOUs with local colleges to cater to the needs of the students and for the welfare of the students.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more students centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
 - Members of the teaching faculty are encouraged to attend refresher and orientation courses, workshops and seminars to enhance their teaching skills and upgrade their knowledge in order to make the teaching learning process completely student-centric.
 - Teachers are also provided with a good general library as well as departmental libraries and access to INFLIBNET facility also.
 - Students are in turn encouraged to make maximum use of the library facilities.
 - Advanced learners get independent learning through extensive use of departmental libraries which houses good books and journals.
 - Teachers are encouraged to move out of the conventional lecture mode of teaching and enhance their teaching with modern teaching aids.
 - Teaching is also required to be made more effective by making it interactive.
 - Teachers opt for quizzes, debates, group discussions, and paper presentations by the students at the departmental levels.
 - Students are encouraged to give paper presentations in departmental seminars and make power point presentations.
 - Academic tours, botanical excursions, industrial visits, geographical survey, sampling, questionnaires and data collection are some of the measures to widen the students' perspectives and help them to become eligible for the latest trends in career options inspite of belonging to this tribal area and following traditional courses only.
 - Students are motivated to attend lectures regularly, appear for the internal tests and enhance the other facets of their personality by



participating in the various literary, cultural and sports activities conducted in the college.

• Involvement in the activities of the departmental societies, NSS, NCC and the Youth Red Cross Society of the college is also instrumental in promoting good ethics, leadership and positive behavioral patterns among students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The institution provides an effective platform for the students to exhibit their extra-curricular skills by organizing elocutions, extempore, debates, essay-writing, quiz and various other cultural competitions.
- Sports events nurture a sense of fair play among them while science projects, outdoor activities like field tours, botanical excursions, and industrial visits enhance their creativity and scientific temper.
- Students are encouraged not merely to participate in college events but to meet students of other colleges at district, state and university level competitions as well.
- Lectures on holistic development and career guidance also enhance their thought process.
- 'URJA' the annual magazine of the college enables the students to recognize and enhance their hidden potentials.
- Seminars, Charts, models, PowerPoint presentations, project work, group discussion, computer awareness at the college level are also instrumental in strengthening the scientific temper of the students.
- Activities of the English club prove to be a good measure for the students to improve their communicative skills in English and develop their personality with self-confidence.



- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg; Virtual laboratories, elearning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology(NME-ICT), open educational resources mobile education etc;
 - E-Learning resources from NPTEL and NME-ICT are not available in the institution currently.
 - However the institution is striving to provide optimum modern educational facilities with its limited scope and resources.
 - The General library has facility of INFLIBNET for the students.
 - The institution has a computer lab with 20 computers which enables students to use them freely.
 - Internet facility is also available
 - Though the major portion of the teaching process comprises of lecture methods, several teachers are now opting for innovative and modern teaching methods with stress on use of computers and internet.
 - The lack of adequate e-learning resources is replaced by highly effective additional aids such as field tours, excursions, industrial visits, project works, power point presentations etc.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of Knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc;)?

Lectures on advanced topics by subject experts are conducted for the students through MOUs with other institutions. Teachers are motivated to attend seminars and workshops. Temporary teachers are given one day training in teaching skills. As per Government and UGC guidelines attending refresher courses is mandatory for regular teachers.

- 2.3.7 Detail (Process and the no. of students/benefitted)on the academic,personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?
 - Lectures were conducted on career counseling, coaching for entry in services, personality development, motivation, health-related and on



holistic development by organizations like Gayatri Pariwar and Art of Living Foundation.

- The first World Yoga Day was celebrated on 21st June 2015 and nearly 1500 students were benefitted by these efforts.
- Students are also provided with one–on-one guidance by teachers who act as counsellors for academic and personal support.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - Teachers are encouraged to use modern teaching aids such as L.C.D., Projectors and give PowerPoint presentations to make their lectures more effective.
 - They are also encouraged to avail the facility of N-List and INFLIBNET.
 - Lectures need to be supported by interactive sessions to bring in the involvement of the students.
 - Teachers are motivated to conduct academic tours, field visit, botanical excursions, geographical surveys, industrial visits to broaden the perspectives of the students.
 - Institution provides latest teaching aids and it is necessary to utilize them and motivate teachers to make the optimum use.
 - A one-day workshop was organized for the teachers on PowerPoint presentation.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The institution boasts of a well-equipped independent Library building which houses 50970 books, 27 journals and facility of separate library for candidates belonging to SC/ST categories, with well-ventilated and spacious reading rooms. 10 newspapers and 8 weekly magazines are subscribed to and students and staff have easy access to INFLIBNET and N-list facilities.(With more than 97000 e-books andmore than 6000 e-journals)
- The institution has 12 PG libraries with a rich collection of reference books and journals.



- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
 - Yes, sometimes certain unavoidable and essential activities such as the process of student union elections, supplementary examinations, celebration of certain days, organizing of lectures, etc; do result in loss of precious teaching hours.
 - Teachers strive to compensate for this loss by taking extra classes and supplying adequate notes and study material to the students.
 - Electricity failures and low voltage also affect the practical classes of science faculty which are compensated later by extra classes.
 - The training programmes for Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha Elections were conducted in the college building and the staff was also engaged in the same programme there by resulting in heavy losses in the teaching days during the session 2013 – 14

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The quality of teaching is monitored by the feedback wich is obtained from the students.
- The feedback contents are analysed and it is submitted to the Principal and are incorporated into the recommendations of IQAC
- All the teachers are expected to maintain a Daily Diary which is monitored by the Principal.
- The Internal Examination Committee prepares the schedule for internal tests in compliance with the Academic Calendar and teachers conduct the tests.
- Students are encouraged to be present for the tests and the results are tabulated after evaluation.
- A seven day workshop organized by RUSA (Rashtray Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan) at the district level was instrumental in enhancing the quality of teaching.
- Newly inducted temporary teachers are also given orientation and training.

- The permanent teachers in the institution are recruited by the State Government and retention is according to government policies.
- To meet the immediate requirements of the college, temporary teachers are appointed through the Janbhagidari Samiti and the Principal according to the norms of the State Government and UGC for specified period.
- The vacant regular posts are filled by Guest Lecturers who are appointed by an internal selection committee, chaired by the Principal, which scrutinizes the applications invited through local dailies and the process is completed as per the state government and UGC norms for a specified period.
- In both the cases candidates are required to have a minimum of 55% at PG level and additional points are given M.Phil, Ph.D., NET, and SET/SLET.

The Internal Examination Committee prepares the schedule for internal test and notifications are circulated among the students and teachers. Teachers conduct internal tests as per schedule, evaluate the answer sheets and tabulate the results which are disclosed to the students.
 - Through the internal tests which are modelled on the University examination pattern, students are prepared for the pattern of questions.
 - Question bank of the previous exams is maintained in all the departments to help the students to prepare for the annual examination.

- In order to improve students' performances in examinations the Affiliating University has conferred Autonomy, Semester system and Choice Based Credit System to several institutions.
- However, our institution does not provide these facilities. The college follows the directives given by the University.
- Internal tests, departmental seminars, Quiz etc. at the institutional level are conducted to prepare the students for the University Examinations.
- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?
 - The evaluative patterns of the University are implemented in the Institution through the internal tests which are modelled on the University examination pattern and evaluation and tabulation is also completed similarly with acceptance of student's demand for recounting and revaluation of their answer sheets by the subject teachers.

 - Students are guided for their projects file work and mock tests for their viva are also conducted in order to reduce their stress and fear.
 - Self confidence is instilled by motivating students to take active part in debates, discussions, PowerPoint presentations at college level and acknowledging their efforts.
 - College teachers also act as internal examiners during practical examinations also thus ensuring that students are comfortable and get the marks they deserve.
 - Students are encouraged to appear for the internal tests so that their performance can be assessed and necessary action can be taken for both slow and advanced learners.

 - There is no benefit given for behavioral aspects, independent learning and communication skills, however departmentwise pursuance of internal assessment has been proposed to the Affliating University

- Transfers of senior teachers on promotion leading to a shortage of faculty.
- Involvement of all the male teachers in the LokSabha andVidhanSabha elections as Master Trainers.
- Involvement of several lab technicians and lab assistants in election duty and other administrative duties (Census, SVEEP, EPIC Card etc.)
- Engaging of college building for election training and polling purposes causing disruption in teaching.

 - The foremost purpose of the institution's strategies is to ensure the maximum number of pass percentage among students.



- To achieve this, teachers work hard to complete the syllabus in time and in case of unavoidable circumstances in failing to complete it in time, they resort to extra classes.
- Lectures are complemented with notes, lab experiments, study material, paper presentations, group discussions, quiz etc;
- The rich General library with good reference books and journals and added facility of INFLIBNET enhance the student's knowledge.
- The PG libraries also have several good books for reference as well as good journals.
- Internal tests and assignments are conducted and evaluated and results are tabulated.
- Practical examination with VIVA enables students to increase their aggregate marks.
- Preparation of Environmental project files and VIVA for all first years student are also carried out by the teachers.
- 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students) of the courses offered?
 - This is an affiliated college situated in the tribal area, catering to the needs of students from relatively weaker socio-economic background.
 - Majority of the students are from working class and most students travel long distances from nearby villages to attend classes.
 - The socio-economic conditions are often unfavorable for girls to pursue higher studies.
 - The institution offers only traditional courses in arts, science and commerce and post graduate programmes in 12 subjects.
 - Teachers ensure that students avail optimum benefit through good library facilities and extremely congenial and student-centric atmosphere.
 - Students are exposed to computer-aided teaching and learning methods.
 - Lectures are augmented with interactive methods of teaching and learning such as group discussions, debates, quiz, and interactive sessions.
 - Activities of the English club help the students in enhancing their communicative skills in English.



- PG students are encouraged to present papers at departmental level.
- Acedmic tours, field trips, excursions, industrial visits, surveys are also conducted.
- Lectures on various topics are also conducted.
- Students are motivated to join NCC and NSS and participate in the activities of the Youth Red Cross /Society.
- Students are prepared to become eligible for employment from the local PSUs and industries. Majority of students opt for government jobs in teaching, police and defence services on the basis of merit and certificates of performances in NCC and sports.
- PG students are motivated to assist their teachers in research activities.
- Efforts are made to curb the drop-out rate.

- Although there is no provision for internal assessment of students in all subjects except practical examinations and M.Com, teachers encourage students to participate in internal test and use it as a preparation for their University examinations.
- Classroom behaviour and performance in internal examinations help to identify slow and advanced learners and provide necessary assistance to them.
- Results of university examinations are pointers for the teachers to increase their thrust in certain areas.
- Emphasis is laid on regular attendance in practical classes, preparation of projects files and VIVA.
- Learning skills are enhanced by access to rich General and Departmental libraries with access to INFLIBNET.
- Special cases of students with problems are dealt with by the teachers on individual basis.

• Continuous efforts are made by the teachers to prepare students for University examinations and focus on their complete personality development.

 - The students organize awareness rallies for AIDS, blood donation, prohibition of alcoholism, blood group testing etc on a regular basis.
 - Students are also actively involved in SVEEP (Systematic Voters Education and Electoral Participation) to create electoral awareness among the youth and the village communities. Student representatives function as campus ambassador for SVEEP.
 - The huge play ground of the college is utilized by schools in the neighbourhood for their sports activities and it is a favourite spot for morning walkers and health and fitness enthusiasts who spend their time here every morning for walking, jogging and physical exercises.
 - The college provides an effective platform for holistic activities of renowned organizations like Gayatri Pariwar and Art of living foundations for conducting lectures, meditation sessions and book exhibitions.
 - College students involve in the collection of funds for needy people and victims of natural calamities.

- NSS and YRC are predominantly responsible for the execution of extension and outreach programmes.
- NSS units organize tree plantation programmes to create environmental awareness and conservation of the green campus.
- Students of YRC society are given certificates for regular blood donation.
- Outreach programmes comprise the joint activities of NSS and YRC in the one day and seven day camps of NSS in the nearby villages wherein students spread awareness of hygiene and health, literacy drives etc.
- Students of NSS engage in cleaning of ponds and its nearby locations.
- Students of the YRC visit slums and old age home to distribute food items, fruits and spread awareness and happiness.
- These extension and outreach programmes have a long lasting impact on the minds of the students in bringing out a sense of responsibility and humanitarianism in them.



- 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?
 - NSS volunteers are given certificates of merit for the hours of work they put in and for their various activities.
 - Students of YRC and others are also given certificates of merit for blood donation.
 - Refresher programmes are organized for volunteers and faculty involved in NSS.
 - NCC cadets are also motivated for active participation during their camps and other activities.
 - Several members of the faculty are invited as judges in competitions, subject experts in teachers interviews, chief guests etc; in the local schools.
 - A member of the faculty taught the illiterate domestic help in her neighbourhood to sign their names and identify currency notes.
 - The Sports Department had organised a free martial arts demonstration and training for the college students.
 - The Sports officer also visits other institutions as coach and referee for various events.
 - A member of the faculty was involved in teaching the trainee police constables.
 - Two members of the faculty created voice recordings of nearly 1000 pages of Handbooks for the erstwhile Additional Collector of Korba District, Shri R.P. Gupta who is partially visually impaired.
 - Several members of the faculty are regular blood donors.
 - All the male staff of the faculty is appointed as Master Trainers, Nodal officers, etc; during Parliamentary elections and SVEEP district programmes.
 - Two members of the faculty also have translated chapters on a book on Autism from English to Hindi for the Inner Wheel Education Society.
 - On an individual basis all faculty members provide financial help to needy students during admissions and examinations.
 - Financial aid had been given to family members of non-teaching staff after their untimely demise.



- A member of the faculty has been serving as District Co-ordinator of RMO (Regional Mathematical Olympiad) since 2013 and has successfully conducted their yearly examination.
- A member of the faculty has adopted two children (girls) through World Vision and offers annual financial aid to them.
- Members of the staff are also engaged in translations, motivational lectures, providing help to needy people in the society

- They are assisted by the YRC society who visit the camps and conduct free blood group testing and medical awareness camps and arrange lectures and distribute biscuits, sweets, fruits and toys to the village children.

 - Members of the faculty are actively involved with the local administration in the activities of SVEEP, Baseline Survey, Census, Election training and polling activities as Nodal officers, Master Trainers, Presiding officers etc.

 - Members of class-III, Class-IV category also participate as BLOs in activities such as census, polling, epic card distribution, voter list preparation etc;
 - The principal of the Institution also serves as a member of the governing body of several local schools and colleges.
 - Members of staff are invited to visit various local schools and colleges as subject experts in the interview panel for teachers, judges in various competitions, science exhibitions, fairs etc.
 - Institution has been successful in procuring sports ground as venues for several tournaments and auditorium for National Seminars from local PSUs.
 - Members of the staff are also involved as Nodal Officers of SVEEP, CHIPS, AISHE, New Education Policy.
 - A member of the Sociology department is involved in conducting a district level social audit under the auspices of the Women and Child Welfare Department of Korba district, on the working of the Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU), in collaboration with professors of sociology from other colleges of the district.
 - As the lead college of the District, the college serves as examination centre/study centre for various open Universities (IGNOU, MLC, Pt. Sundarlal Sharma Open University).
 - It is also the centre for various examinations of the VYAPM (C.G.) and other examinations of nursing colleges, police department, PSUs etc;



- The Botany department interacts with the forest department for tree plantation programmes.
- A motivational, power-packed lecture was given by Dr. Ajay Shesh, a young leading pathologist of Korba and a two-time Guinness World Record holder of the 'Longest Marathon Speech' of 60 hours to the students in which he gave invaluable tips on personality development and positive thinking for success in life. This lecture was a part of the attempt of Dr. Shesh to address the students of 100 colleges of Chhattisgarh under the 'Ajeya Bharat Prakalp'.

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

- 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?
 - Being a government college, the maximum grants for the institution for building, furniture comes from UGC as well as the state government and the minor maintenance works are carried out with funds from the JanBhagidari Samiti.
 - Under the RUSA scheme proposals for additional classrooms, laboratories, other facilities to meet the needs of the growing student strength are under process.
 - Proposal for roofing of the courtyard has also been sent under RUSA scheme.
 - Proposal for setting up of solar panels worth Rs Ten Lakhs has been approved by RUSA and order has been placed to CREDA.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities-classroom, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipments for teaching, learning and research etc;
- The college has a large multipurpose hall which is used as a classroom as well as a small seminar hall for conducting several lectures, competitions and functions at the institutional level.
- No animal house.
- No special technology enabled learning spaces but all the departments have computers with internet facility for the benefit of the students.
- The department of Botany has developed a Botanical garden in the campus which has several rare and medicinal plants.
- Science departments have separate U.G. as well as P.G. laboratories.



- b) Extra-curricular activities-sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS,NCC cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, Yoga, Health and hygiene etc;
- The Sports Department with a wide range of health and fitness equipments serves as a mini gymnasium.
- The college has a sprawling sports ground with cricket pitches, courts for volley ball, basketball, kho-kho, pits for jumps and facilities for athletics.
- Indoor games include table tennis, chess etc.
- There is no auditorium but the large multipurpose hall is used for various functions, lectures, seminars, cultural, literary competitions etc.
- Students take active part in all the activities of NSS and NCC to enhance their personality and overall development.
- College has an open courtyard where cultural activities, annual function and assembly as required are also conducted.
- Activities of the English Club enhance communicative and spoken English skills.
- Yoga activities are conducted in NSS for volunteers.
- Regular lectures on blood donation, health and hygiene are organized by the Youth Red Cross Society of the college.
- 4.1.3 How does the Institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/ augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/Campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any.)
 - In order to ensure optimum utilization of available infrastructure (classroom) and to meet the requirements of the student strength the college time table is set in two shifts.
 - The college does not have an auditorium but there is a large hall which is used as a classroom but is converted into a mini seminar


hall for activities at the institutional level such as guest lectures, seminars, competitions, functions etc;

- The open courtyard in the main building serves as the basketball court as well as the place for conducting the annual function and other functions.
- The staff room is also converted into the control room for University and other competitive examinations.
- The staffroom is also used for conducting meetings of the staff council, student union, Janbhagidari and during visits of eminent visitors from the Affiliating University.
- As the lead college of the district, the college is the examination centre for various examinations including supplementary examinations of the Affiliating University wherein the large strength of the examinees require the use of all the laboratories also to be used as examination halls.

4.1.4 How does the Institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

- The institution takes care of the needs of the differently abled students by providing their classrooms on the ground floor itself.
- Special seating arrangements are also provided for them.
- Care is taken to escort them to their class, examination hall, washrooms according to their needs.
- A separate entrance with a ramp has been created for them.
- During University examinations visually impaired candidates are permitted to use writers with prior permission from the university.
- 4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them.
 - Hostel Facility- Accommodation available.

Construction of Girls hostel has been completed but its possession is awaited. The Boy's hostel is in use by the District Administration.



However boys and girls coming from remote areas are granted permission to stay in the post matric hostel in the district.

• Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga centre, etc

The institutional has a huge playground for cricket, hockey, volleyball, kho-kho, basketball and athletics. There is a mini gymnasium and provision for indoor games such a table-tennis, chess, carom etc;

• Computer facility including access to Internet in hostel

There is a computer lab with 20 computers, partially computerized office and computers with internet facilities in the various departments. General library also has WiFi connections but no internet facility in the hostels.

• Facilities for medical emergencies-

There is a well equipped 100 bed government hospital and a trauma centre next to the college campus which is easily accessible for staff and students in case of emergencies. The Youth Red Cross Society of the college is instrumental in providing basic first aid if required.

• Library facility in the hostels- NA

• Internet and wifi facility

Internet access is available in the administrative area, Principal's chamber, Computer lab, departments and general library.

• Recreational facility- Common room with audio-visual equipments

Girls are provided with a separate common room but no audio-visual facilities are available there.

• Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy-

MOU with local Public Sector Undertakings such as NTPC, CSEB, BALCO, SECL, and SADA has enabled allotment of fourteen quarters for teaching and non-teaching staff.

• Constant supply of safe drinking water-

Four water coolers with water purifiers have been installed in the main building to provide constant supply of safe drinking water.



• Security

Twelve CCTV cameras have been installed in the campus for security purposes. There are separate watchmen and security guards for day and night for the security of the college.

- 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?
 - There is a government 100 bed hospital and trauma centre next to the college campus which caters to medical needs of the staff and students.
 - Youth Red Cross Society of the College provides primary first aid in case of any medical emergencies.
 - Medical bills of the staff are reimbursed as per state government norms.

To impart quality and job oriented education with moral ethics and discipline to the students of this tribal area for their complete personality development.

- To provide quality education to the students of this tribal area to make them self sufficient and inculcate in them values of self respect, mutual respect, oneness among the college fraternity and enable them to develop a sense of pride towards the institution.
- To cater to the educational needs of the socio- economically weak section of the society and motivating them for research and innovation and providing job opportunities.

- The directives issued by the top management regarding quality policy and plans are implemented by the Principal who appoints teachers in various committees.
- All the teachers follow the Academic calendar, conduct internal tests and analyse the results after evaluation.
- The smooth functioning of these committees is monitored by the IQAC.

- To increase the use of ICT in teaching and learning to enhance the quality of education.
- To inculcate moral ethics and self sufficiency by organizing lectures, talks, activities of NSS, NCC, and other programmes as per government directives.
- To uplift by providing scholarships, books, UGC stipends, remedial coaching to students of the weaker sections.
- To guide students for job opportunities through career counselling and placement cell.

2. Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan.

- Facility of INFLIBNET is made available for post graduate students who are also motivated for research and as a result several students appeared for Ph.D entrance exam from various universities.
- With the help of counselling from teachers many students have procured jobs in teaching, in local PSUs, police and defence forces etc.,
- Lack of proper coaching facilities does not enable the students of this tribal area to be successful in competitive exams. Their financial status also does not permit them to go for professional coaching. Due to their socio- economic background these local students prefer to get jobs only in local areas.

3. Interaction with stakeholders

• Periodical meetings are organized with students, parents, alumni and Jan Bhagidari Samiti for suggestions on the development of the college and towards fulfilling the mission statement.



- The Jan Bhagidari Samiti helped in the construction of a bus stop, introducing and conducting courses through self –finance, arranging salary for these teachers also.
- 4. Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research input and consultations with the stakeholders.
- Periodical meetings with the Jan Bhagidari samiti and the feedback received are used by the Principal in preparing the policy and planning of the college development.
- 5. Reinforcing the culture of excellence.
- The cultural of excellence is maintained through the role of the Principal in ensuring thorough following of the Academic calendar, wherein admissions, internal tests, extra curricular activities, results and their analysis and the feedback thus received is considered upon.
- Needy students are granted financial aid, provided study material and extra coaching and are also encouraged to work hard in the internal test.
- Teachers are also motivated for research, increased use of ICT tools and updating their knowledge.

- The Principal forms various committees to ensure the smooth functioning of the college and the working of the faculty by following the Academic calendar is monitored by the IQAC.
- Feedback from the students is reviewed by the Principal and suggestions received are considered upon.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

• Our college is the lead college of Korba district and is provided leadership opportunities at various levels.


- The college functions as the nodal and co-ordinator centre for various exams conducted by the Professional Examination Board (VYAPAM) and various government activities such as SVEEP etc.
- Members of the faculty serve as nodal officers and co-ordinators for government schemes and projects such as RUSA, AISHE, CHIPS, New Education Policy etc.
- Senior teachers are appointed as members, Dean, Chairman of Board of Studies, Academic Council and Executive Council of the Affiliating University and the Central Board of Studies, Raipur.
- Senior teachers head the teams for inspection of colleges for affiliation, increase in seats, opening of new courses/ new colleges, research centres etc.,.
- Members of the faculty play pivotal roles in the smooth functioning of the UGC committee, IGNOU centre and IQAC.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- The college grooms students for leadership through the Student Union, NCC, NSS and YRC and through departmental societies for post graduate students.
- The Head of the Institution forms various committees to carry out the activities as per the Academic calendar.
- The co-ordinators are instrumental in implementing the proposed activities which are monitored by the IQAC.
- The college conducts University examinations in three shifts. The examination teams as well as the co-ordinators of the various committees are appointed in rotation every session to give scope for new leadership. Members of the faculty are also appointed by the University as members of the Flying Squad during University examinations.
- Senior teachers are members of the Board of Studies at the University level.



• The administrative section is monitored by the Registrar/AGr1 (in charge) under the guidance of the Principal in the effective handling of various sections.





- 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?
 - All the heads of departments along with their faculty members follow the action plan and the academic calendar and are monitored by the Principal.
 - The administrative section of the college also helps in decentralizing the administrative tasks and is monitored by the AGr1/Registrar under the guidance of the Principal.
 - The General Library of the college and the Sports Department also function with the support of the advisory committee.

- Office- bearers of the Student Union, NCC cadets, NSS volunteers and members of the YRC society of the Institution are included in the maintenance of discipline and good will in the college.
- The Principal constitutes various committees to ensure the proper implementation of the college activities.
- The Principal and the members of the Staff Council are jointly involved in taking major decisions for the benefit of the college.
- In order to ensure the smooth working of the administrative section the Principal allots different duties to the non- teaching and administrative staff and monitors their working.

6.2 STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT.

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

- This is an affiliated college which follows the plans, policies and directives given by the Affiliating University and the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh through the Academic and Sports calendar.
- The plans of the calendar are strictly followed by the Institution and its monitoring is done by the IQAC.

6.2.2 Does the Institution have perspective plan for development? If, so give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

- Under RUSA (Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan) or National Higher Education Mission, the college has created a perspective plan for the development of the college from 2012-13 to 2016-17 and has sent it to the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh.
- The IDP has proposals for the development of the college infrastructure.



- Proposals for additional teaching rooms, equipments, books, internet facility and smart class room have also been sent for enhancing the quality of education.
- GER needs to be improved by increasing seats in the available courses and preparing proposals for new courses.
- Proposals for opening new colleges in the remote interior blocks of Korba have also been sent.
- Workshops at district level were organised on the following topics in the college from 7th to 11th August, 2015:
- 1. Improvement in the Quality of Higher Education.
- 2. Evaluation of examination results.
- 3. Data keeping.
- 4. Career orientation.
- 5. Increase in GER.
- 6. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS).
- Under the RUSA scheme the college has received sanction for an amount of Rs 2 crores and the first instalment of Rs 25 Lakhs was released on 16th October, 2015, out of which Rs 10 Lakhs are allotted for the setting up of a solar panel in the college campus by CREDA and Rs 15 Lakhs are allotted for maintenance and repair of existing buildings, electrical and civil works, providing two water coolers for the students, maintenance of toilets in the campus and the creation of an ICT Room in the college.

6.2.3 Describe the internet organizational structure and decision making processes.

• The structure consists of various committees, planning board/ college development committee, staff council, Jan Bhagidari Samitti and the Principal. Major decisions regarding academic and general development of the college are jointly taken by the staff council and the Principal and are approved by the Jan Bhagidari Samitti when required.







6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following-

- Teaching & Learning

- The faculty is encouraged to make increased use of the modern teaching aids and facilities such as INFLIBNET to enhance the quality of teaching.
- Students are also encouraged to use ICT and INFLIBNET and also attend the internal tests so that the evaluation of the same can enable the teachers to identify slow and advanced learners and help them accordingly with additional notes, lectures etc.

- Research & Development

- There are several members of the faculty who are guides for M.Phil and Ph.D.
- They have completed minor research projects successfully and have published several articles in various journals.



- Post Graduate students are motivated for research by involving them in research activities and seminars.
- During the last four years the college had two organised two National seminars and one 7 day Workshop on RUSA and one Workshop on NAAC in collaboration with Government College, Dipka, Korba CG.
 - Community engagement
- The college has active units of NSS, NCC and YRC society.
- The NSS volunteers are instrumental in keeping the campus clean and green through their weekly activities and they also organize and participate in activities such as tree plantation, awareness rallies, cleanliness drive, slogan marches, visits to nearby villages for oneday and seven-day annual camps wherein they enlighten the villagers on health, hygiene, Aids awareness, literacy, voting and elections and also engage in community service.
- The NCC cadets help to maintain discipline and decorum in college during functions. They participate in tree plantation activities, cleanliness drive, aids awareness programs, rallies, formation of human chains with NSS, competitions and attend camps.
- The Youth Red Cross society is one of the most active units of the college. At the beginning of the session a free blood group testing camp for all the new students with health awareness lectures was organized. Blood donation is a regular activity and students are motivated for the same. The student members of the YRC society visit villages at NSS campus to organize health awareness camps and distribute fruits and biscuits for the children there.
- On 4th December 2015 the YRC society had organised a one-day mega free health check up camp in the college in collaboration with the Marwari Yuva Manch, in which the Vice Chancellor of Bilaspur University was a the Chief Guest. A team of twelve doctors had worked diligently and 650 students, villagers and deaf, dumb, blind, school children were benefitted.
- Human resource management
- This is a Government college affiliated to Bilaspur University wherein recruitment of regular teachers and non teaching staff is



done only through the State Government. A selection committee appoints temporary teachers against vacant regular posts as per the Government norms on merit basis after scrutiny of the forms which are received through advertisement in local newspapers.

- Industry interaction
- Post graduate students of Commerce and PGDBM are taken for industrial visits to enable them to widen their vision.

- Heads of departments and teachers provide skill development sessions for lab technicians.



• Almost 50% of the non-teaching staff is computer literate and several short training sessions are conducted for them.

- For academic growth teachers are permitted to attend orientation and refresher courses as per the rule of the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh with duty leave.
- NCC, NSS, Sports Officer and Librarian are also given duty leave to attend training programs.
- Training sessions for skills in ICT organized for teachers.
- Teachers are permitted to attend courses with duty leave and with salary.

 - The Head of the Institution assesses the yearly performance of the teachers through the Confidential Report submitted by them and gives his appraisal and remarks in his report to the Department of Higher Education.

 - The Head of the Institution sends the Confidential Report to the Department of Higher Education where decisions are taken but are not communicated to anybody.

 - There are provisions for Earned leave, Medical leave, Reimbursement of medical bills(as per norms),Duty leave with TA, DA increments in pay, increase in DA, G.I.S, house rent,Tribal allowance and Tribal leave for the regular staff.
 - Class III and class IV employees are entitled to festival advance and class IV employees get uniforms also.
 - There is provision of Anukampa Niyukti for the children of the staff after their sudden demise. Financial health is given to the family of the deceased staff member immediately for funeral purpose as per government rules.
 - Nearly 80-90% of the staff avails these benefits.

• Since ours is a Government college all recruitments are done only through State Government as per the norms. Retainment, retirement and extensions are also carried out only through the rules of the State Government.

(मंडार क्रय नियम, 2005)
- Internal audit is done by members appointed by the Principal and external audit is conducted through audit agencies such as Chartered Accountants, State govt and Accountant General's office.

 - The action plan of the department and the Academic calendar are strictly followed by the faculty.
 - The daily diary and attendance register is checked by the Principal every month.
 - According to the Academic Calendar internal and tests are conducted, evaluated and results are analysed thus enabling the teachers to identify slow and advanced learners and provide necessary help to them as per their requirement.

• All the information is conveyed to the students as well as external and internal stakeholders through the report presented by the Principal during the annual function .The students are given important information by the Heads of Departments .The coordinators of the college committees serve to disclose the policies and outcomes to the stakeholder there meeting.

• Our college is the lead college of Korba district with 9 Government Colleges and 9 private colleges under it. All the directives of the Department of Higher Education, C.G. Government are communicated to all these colleges and vice-versa.



- The college is appointed as the co-ordinator centre for all the exams of the Professional Board of Exams (VYAPAM).
- It is also the Nodal centre for activities of SVEEP etc.
- IDP of RUSA for the district was prepared by the college.
- The results of the Student Union Elections of all the colleges of the district were communicated to the University by the lead college.
- The Principal of the lead college attends meetings at the Secretariat, Higher Education, Raipur.
- The Principal is also vested with drawing and disbursing powers of other colleges.
- Activities such as Lok Seva Guarantee and RTI are handled by the lead college.







CRITERION VII INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS.

- 7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?
 - The college has a sprawling campus of 50 acres which is full of greenery. The college has always worked to maintain the clean, green and eco friendly campus with special emphasis on the plantation and nurturing of the saplings thereafter. The NCC and NSS volunteers deserve credit in this direction. The Botany Department of the college has a small but well- maintained Botanical gender with many medicinal plants. The Sports Department also has a beautiful garden with greenery and beautiful flowers. The creation of a green belt and hedging of some plants.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- Energy conservation
- All the staff and students are encouraged to switch off lights, fans and computers when not in use
- Energy –efficient CFL and LED lights are used in several rooms.
- Efforts are on to install a solar panel in the college under the RUSA scheme to cut down electricity consumption.
- Use of renewable energy
- Under the RUSA scheme an instalment of Rs 25 lakhs was released for the development purposes of the college. Out of this Rs 10 lakhs are allotted for the setting up of a solar panel in the campus by CREDA and work in this direction is in progress.
- Water harvesting.
- There is a rain water harvesting pit in the campus to store rain water.
- Check dam construction NO



- Efforts for Carbon neutrality.
- There are two compost pits in the campus and the workers are strictly advised to put the dried leaves, grass, waste paper and organic waste (if any) into the pits and not to burn the garbage.
- Plantation
- Tree plantation is a major activity which is organized in the campus to keep it clean and green. NCC cadets and NSS volunteers actively participate in them.
- The State Government sponsored "Hariyar Chhattisgarh" programme which included planting of saplings was organized in the campus.
- The "Selfie with Seedling" programme was conducted in the campus in the presence of the Collector of Korba District.
- Hazardous waste management
- No hazardous wastes are found in any of the science laboratories.
- E-waste management
- E-waste generated from the departments is disposed off through the recommendation of the physical verification committee by the Heads of Departments who propose to the write off committee for its proper disposal with the final approval of the Principal.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the college.

In an innovative attempt to build leadership qualities in the students the faculty involves the participation of senior students in the following feilds:

- Senior under officers are encouraged to take charge of the NCC unit during routine training.
- The departmental libraries are handled by the post graduate students under the guidance of the teachers.



- In the English Club also post graduate student conduct activities for junior students in building their self confidence in improving their communicative skills.
- In the departmental seminars at the post graduate level the students conduct and evaluate their performances themselves under the guidance of their teachers.
- In several cases post graduate students present papers for the juniors in order to enhance their skills.
- A lot of emphasis is laid on the group interaction method in learning and teaching.
- In the field of extension activities, students are made to involve in interacting with differently abled children in order to make them realize their self worth and improve themselves.
- Students who are active and out- going in studies and other activities are recognized by the teachers and felicitated (with certificates)
- In the activities and functions organized by Departmental societies the students are given complete freedom to organize and host the entire function.
- Sports alumni are invited to coach students and become referees also and their services are acknowledged by the college.

In keeping up with the best practice of clean, green, eco-friendly campus, the faculty has developed the innovative habit of recycling of paper instead of wasting the blank side of used paper.

- Old files are also recycled in all the departments
- As IGNOU counsellors teachers guide post graduate students regularly and supply notes and study material free of cost.
- All the teachers distribute specimen copies of the text books to needy students.
- Youth Red Cross Society Volunteers are always available and ready to help the differently abled students in any medical emergency.



- Members of the faculty visit local colleges to deliver guest lectures without claiming TA/DA or any remuneration.
- Efforts are on to increase the computer skills of the staff members by the teachers of the Computer Department after their teaching hours.
- Students collect funds for needy people and students of other college during any crises.



7.3 BEST PRACTICES

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no. 98, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

BEST PRACTICE – I

Title of the Practice

Improving the communicative skills of the students in English through modern and advanced teaching aids and by having interactive sessions with them.

Goal :

Majority of the students belong to the rural background with Hindi as their medium of instruction. Their socio-economic background does not permit them to move out of Korba for higher education and hence efforts are taken to impart proper exposure of English and encouraging them to actively participate in the Spoken English sessions to enhance their skills and shed their inhibitions.

The context

Since the students have very poor knowledge of grammar and no practice of speaking in English, the faculty members work hard to involve students in the activities which are held in an extremely informal manner which enables the students to feel at ease. Basic grammatical concepts and errors are dealt with and emphasis is laid on getting the students to communicate freely.

The Practice:

The language lab is well equipped with ICT tools. Students participate in elocution, extempore, group discussions on a wide range of topics. The Post Graduate students of the English Department are motivated to play the lead role under the guidance of the teachers in order to inculcate leadership qualities in them. Students are encouraged to join in the JAM (Just a Minute) sessions where gradually they give up their inhibitions and learn to speak


fluently in English. Quizzing is also popular among the students wherein difficult aspects of grammar are made easy and enjoyable. An innovative method of teaching is the screening of English and Hindi movies and plays of Shakespeare which are relevant to the syllabus of the English literature students. This has proved beneficial in establishing a good rapport among the students and the role of the post graduate students in giving necessary remarks and information during the film is invaluable. Students are encouraged to develop their reading habits and focus on pronunciation.

Evidence of success

The number of students joining the activities of the English Club is always on the increase and the students are eager to participate in the interactive sessions. The feedback got form the students is also very important wherein they are advised to write their thoughts in a paragraph and even though they are not grammatically fully correct their efforts deserve appreciation and are effective in motivating the teachers to work harder to enhance the communicative skills of these students.

Problems Encountered :

Students come from long distances by bus and hence many times they are unable to attend the activities of the English Club. Poor grammatical base of the students hampers the level of the activities.Poor reading habits also create difficulties.

Resources Required:

There is a need for more teachers in the English department so that work load may be distributed and more emphasis can be laid on the activities of the English club.

BEST PRACTICE - II

Title:

To maintain a clean, green and eco friendly campus.

Goal:

To create awareness among the students about the growing hazards of environmental pollution. To motivate them to participate in the activities in keeping the campus clean, green and eco friendly.

Context:

The industrial city of Korba is famous for its numerous power plants and coal mines. Both cause severe pollution in and around Korba making it one of the most highly polluted cities of India. Therefore the need to create a clean, green campus and involving the students in spreading this message across to the society.

Practice:

The most important step in this direction is the activity of tree plantation in the campus. Significant programmes in this initiative include celebration of the state Government programme of "Hariyar Chhattisgarh" and programme from the collectorate of "Selfie with Seedling" in which NSS volunteers, students and the entire faculty participated. The small but well maintained Botanical garden is the result of the untiring efforts of the post graduate students and the faculty of the Department of Botany which has several rare and medicinal plants. The Sports Department also has a beautiful garden full of greenery and roses. NSS volunteers are involved in the creation of a green belt which can be used as a mini open air auditorium. All the workers, students and staff are advised to reduce the use of polythene. Segregation of organic waste is done and it is dumped into the two compost pits and burning of garbage is strictly forbidden. Use of air horns inside the campus is also not allowed. Efforts for awareness of carbon neutrality are made. Students participate in awareness rallies and campaigns for conservation of the environment. Due to inadequate funds the construction of a boundary wall was not possible but the management has taken an initiative of an eco friendly alternative of fencing and hedging the campus.



Evidence:

The presence of lush greenery in the campus is a pleasing sight. Students have realized the hazards of pollution and sensitive issues like global warming and hence they participate in large numbers in these activities. There are two compost pits for garbage disposal and also a rain water harvesting system to create awareness for the need to conserve water.

Problems:

Inspite of repeated warnings, requests and orders sometimes the workers prefer to take a shortcut by burning off the dried leaves in the campus .Preference of using disposable items such as cups, plates, glasses is another major hurdle. Extreme climatic conditions also hamper the growth of the saplings.

Resources Required:

To make provisions for adequate resources and gardening staff to take care of the gardens and the saplings. The need to increase awareness among the students and to get better participation from them.
